
## Sunday, February 12, 2023

At the dinner table, in the car, we talk about our faith, wherever we are!




In today's Gospel Jesus advises his disciples (and us!) how to keep God's commandments.

**BIGGER ONES:** In today's Gospel, Jesus says, "whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment...go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift." Do you have a brother, sister, friend, or classmate that you need to reconcile with? If you are having difficulty, pray for the humility to do so.

**FAMILY CHALLENGE:** This week's Gospel is connected to the 10 Commandments. Review them together as a family and perhaps use it as an examination of conscience for confession.

## Looking Toward Lent
