


Sunday, February 19, 2023

The Feast of the Chair of St. Peter falls on February 22, which is also Ash Wednesday this year. This feast day celebrates both the papacy and St. Peter as the first bishop of Rome. In today's Gospel, Jesus instructs us to "be perfect as your Heavenly Father is perfect" but we all know human beings are not perfect. And so St. Peter was not perfect. He fell asleep in the Garden of Gethsemane instead of praying as Jesus asked and he denied Jesus three times. However, he also performed many miracles, won a large number of converts, and preached throughout Jerusalem and Judea. At the dinner table, in the car, we talk about our faith, wherever we are!




In today's Gospel, Jesus urges us to resist retaliation & to love our enemy. These seem like very difficult (impossible?) things to do, but the message of Jesus is that by doing so, we will love more completely and perfectly like our Heavenly Father.

LITTLE ONES: Have you ever tried to get even with someone who has done you wrong? This can be difficult to deal with, but Jesus wants us to not try to get even. Next time that happens, try praying: "Holy Spirit, give me the grace to be generous to those that hurt me."

BIGGER ONES: Today's Gospel goes against what our society teaches us. Jesus reminds us to not settle for what society expects us to do, but what God expects from us. This week ask the Holy Spirit to help you discern God's voice from the noise of society.

FAMILY CHALLENGE: Try reciting the Act of Love together: "O my God, I love You above all things with my whole heart and soul, because You are all good and worthy of all my love. I love my neighbor as myself for the love of You. I forgive all who have injured me and I ask pardon of those whom I have injured. Amen."
